LISTED BELOW ARE TEN SUGGESTIONS FOR LIVESTOCK OWNERS IN CASE OF AN ACCIDENT RESULTING IN RADIOACTIVE CONTAMINATION



- A farm plan of action should be developed in advance for the sheltering, feeding and care of animals during periods of possible contamination.
- Pay attention to televised/radio warnings of actual or possible radiation contamination. Arrange for the safety of your family and yourself.
- Shelter farm animals. Feed and water livestock from stored feed and protected water.
- All feed should be brought into a building or covered if outdoors before it is contaminated.
- Cover any wells, rain barrels and tanks with tarpaulins and store as much water as possible for livestock inside.
- If pasture or harvest crops are contaminated, do not graze your animals until the pasture/crops are determined to be uncontaminated.
- Stay indoors once radiation has reached your area until you receive official information that the area is safe. If you must go outside, wear protective clothing.
- Stay tuned to the Emergency Broadcast System to remain aware of the degree of contamination in your area.
- Keep informed and play it safe until authorities report it is safe for you, your livestock and your farm products.
- Contact your local Extension office, any local USDA agency representative or your local Emergency Coordinator if you have questions about planning or responding to radiation contamination.

It was a very long day for the candidates and they were put through a series of groups of goats to place and give oral reasons for their ranking. This class is structured to test not only your knowledge but your ability to perform when conditions are less than ideal. Most livestock events are held outdoors or have little heat/ air conditioning and are typically long days. Judges must be able to show that they have what it takes to perform without regard to a changing environment and maintain solid reasons with a professional attitude. Above all MGR judges must be able to choose goats that not only have good structure but have correct breed character. I am very proud to announce that we have three new MGR Certified Judges to add to our list; Wade Buntin from KY, Linda Ferris from IL and Joseph Turney from MS.

The 2013 National Show was held on October 12, 2013 in conjunction with the MS State Fair and was a wonderful event. This was the first MGR National Show to have all MGR Certified Judges on the panel; those judges were Terry Alleva from AL, Wade Buntin from KY and Tim Ervin from MS. I honestly did not envy their task of selecting the National Champions as there was an outstanding group of Myotonics presented.

THE GOURMET GOAT: NORTHERN CHEVON STIR FRY

Ingredients:

3/4 lbs. goat meat, cut into 1" x 2" strips

3 Tbsp. vinegar

4 Tbsp. vegetable oil

1/2 cup chicken broth

Salt, pepper and seasonings to taste

1 large onion, chopped

1 bunch of broccoli cut into florets

3 medium carrots, sliced

10 mushrooms, sliced

2 tart apples, cut into cubes

Cooked rice or pasta

Instructions:

Marinate strips of meat in mixture of vinegar, 2 Tbsp. of the vegetable oil, seasonings and chicken broth for 3 to 4 hours or overnight in refrigerator. Heat wok or electric frying pan until very hot. Pour in remaining 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil. Add chopped onion to the pan and stir fry for 10 seconds. Remove meat from marinade and add to wok. Cook 1 to 2 minutes; then remove meat with slotted spoon. Pour marinade into the cooking pan. Add broccoli florets and carrot slices, cover and steam until tender. Return meat to pan and add cubed apples and sliced mushrooms. Toss together until mixture is heated through. Serve immediately over rice or pasta. Serves 8.

MGR Breeders Jason and Christina Duffy

Hi, I am Jason Duffy, co-owner along with my wife Christina of Duffy Fainting Goat Farm. My wife and I have always shared the love of animals, probably me more then her, but it's a package deal. In the spring of 2010 we decided to pursue our love of animals on a bigger scale and started our farm business.

Christina and I decided on goats, more specifically Myotonic Goats. We purchased two bucks, three does and a wether, all from relatively local breeders. Myotonic Goats are pretty rare in western NY and are not easy to find, so we wound up driving several hours in all directions.

Now that we had goats, the learning process really began. We learned a lot from the local breeders and then of course from the breeders on the internet. That said, I have to mention Lisa Edinger; she was our adopted goat mom and we could not have done it without her. Of course we also learned from trial and error along the way. Our first breeding season was an experience all in itself. Our first kidding was an aborted birth a month early. Our second kidding was worse—the mother's birth canal never opened and we lost momma and the baby, even with our veterinarian's help. Those two out of the way, things went better and we finished our first kidding season with a lot more experiences than we expected.

The breeders we spoke to also pointed us in the direction to show our goats. Our first show was in Reading, PA and we did very well with one of our bucklings, Roogagh. He took first place in his age group, won junior champion buck, and then went on to win grand champion in his first show. That was all it took to get us hooked. Roogagh recently received his third point and is now a permanent grand champion.

With showing I also learned more about the breed standard. This led me to purchase more goats, specifically Tennessee Myotonics. At this point we only have 2 of our original goats and they are the only 2 not from Tennessee other than a recent purchase

from Alabama. We have purchased our goats from some of the top breeders hoping to bring their success to our little farm.

Obviously always wanting my goats to be in show condition has been the major challenge. I have experimented with feeds and supplements and different hay. I think this is something we all do until we find what best suits our specific farms, goals and circumstances. Our major challenge here with conditioning is the weather. Western NY weather can be bad; we are about 45 minutes from Buffalo—need I say more? In winter the snow is deeper than the goats are tall and they can spend weeks in the barn without seeing the outdoors. Heated buckets are a must as are heat lamps for kidding. Then spring comes and I am amazed I have never had to "unstick" a goat knee-deep in mud. We also have a lot of coyote and foxes. This brought us to purchase Great Pyrenees livestock guardian dogs which we now also breed and have not had any problems with predators since.

We recently started working with and selling some of our kids to local meat industry specific breeders who are crossing them with Boers and Kiko goats. They are doing this to try and come up with a hardier, heavier muscled goat specific for the meat industry.

Our current plans are to continue as we are: showing our goats, chasing points and trying to better our herd. Our future plans, God willing, are to move south once I retire from my law enforcement job and do the goat business on a larger scale and get more into the meat aspect of the goat industry. Christina is all for moving south, but I am not sure how she will handle the meat industry part of it.

I want to thank all the breeders that I have come to call friends, without them none of this would be possible.

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MARKETING YOUR MYOTONICS

This year has been hard on the majority of Myotonic breeders. While a poor economy has not helped, what are the reasons why people are finding it difficult to sell their goats?

- Over populated market
- Transportation costs

I think to look at the problem, the first thing a breeder should do is determine why they are breeding myotonic goats in the first place and what market are they breeding for. The five main areas considered are Show market, Commercial Meat market, and Local market, breeding stock or pet market.

Many people will decide they want to breed and sell show quality goats. If these goats are successful on the show circuit, they can command a good price both for the show goat and any offspring. But can you cover your costs and make a profit breeding for show alone? If you look at the number of shows held each year compared to the number of people breeding show goats, how many end up being successful enough to ensure they have a viable operation? Are your show goats winning Championships or are they placing at the end of the class? There is also no guarantee that a show champion will produce show quality offspring. How many shows will you have to attend and how many wins will you need before buyers consider you a serious source for championship stock? If this is your only avenue for sales, in such a competitive market, it is going to be difficult to break even or make a profit. One question to ask yourself is, if you are currently breeding show goats and your goats are not placing well, are you really breeding show goats? With the increase in production costs for most breeders, show quality stock is also more expensive to buy. Buyers have to choose wisely and make sure that purchases are going to bring the best possible benefits to their herd.

Many people I have spoken to this year have said they are also trying to break into the meat market. I think for the most part they intend to do this in addition to what has been working for them in the past. Running a fully commercial herd is different from taking some goats to the market. Commercial herds are normally large in number and most successful if buyers are signed into sales contracts before the goats to be sold are even born. If you intend to try and sell some of your herd at the sale barn you need to be aware of when in the year is the best time to sell and also when you can get the best price per pound.

Many breeders limit the number of intact bucks they sell to breeders for two reasons:

- It maintains their bloodlines within their herd and if someone wants that bloodline they have to buy from that breeder.
- Only the best quality animals they produce are sold intact and anything that does not meet the highest standard is wethered. This ensures quality standards the breeder has set for their herd is maintained.

If you are selling intact bucks at the sale barn the chances are that local buyers will pick them up and this will result in more local competition for sales. It is better to sell by the pound for meat and if possible, wether before you sell.

Having never run a commercial herd I am not qualified to express an opinion on that type of operation but would ask any breeder who is considering this as an option to research it thoroughly. I know of one Kiko breeder who has an organic farm operation and also runs a Kiko commercial herd. He has a full time job with a lot of colleagues of ethnic minority who want to buy goat meat at specific times of the year. He breeds for that very specific market and while he does not have a large herd, what he is doing is very profitable. To me it makes sense to take any animals that do not meet the breed standard or personal standards you have set for your herd to market. I try to get them up to 50 - 60 lbs and then take them. If you intend to try and sell these type of goats as pets, consider the cost of feed, etc. until they are sold. Having said that, in some parts of the country people will pay more for a pet than can be realized at the sale barn. Know your options and what you can expect to get before deciding which avenue to pursue.

Many people I have spoken to have said that one of the biggest obstacles to sales is that the market is flooded with myotonic goats. I assume they mean their local market. If you live in an area that has many breeders you are competing with those breeders for every sale. Are they selling and you are not? Why? Be honest in appraising both your stock and theirs. Does theirs look better than yours in respect of breed standard and health? If not are they under pricing you? There is a huge problem in the locals markets with people selling "myotonic goats" for next to nothing. A lot of the time these myotonics are in fact cross breeds but there are a lot of people out there, just looking for cheap goats. If you are happy with the quality of your herd, advertise as 100% registered breeding stock. The selling price of any goat however is determined by the local market. In some parts of the country this is much lower

than in others. This does not mean your goat is any less desirable but you do need to consider the top price you can expect to get for your stock when looking at the cost of your operation.

This brings us to breeding stock. Most breeders whether they show or not, have a desire to improve on their herd. I have yet to see the perfect goat. If you can appraise your animals honestly then you can see where faults are and what needs to be corrected. This is an ongoing process and will likely require purchase from other breeders who have a goat with the qualities you are looking for. Make good choices and buy the animals that can bring the most benefit to your herd. This is probably the biggest market for myotonics as it includes those people ready to make their first purchase and also those who wish to add to their herd. One of the problems both in selling breeding and show stock is the cost of transportation. While there are some very good transporters out there, be sure if you are using them you have a clear understanding of responsibilities. Word of mouth is the best advertisement so ask other breeders who have used the transporter you are considering using. Another way to cut costs in show stock is to offer to deliver to shows. I would never charge for this service as free transportation will help sell your goats.

To summarize, two of the main issues that breeders have highlighted to me are increased costs and slow sales. The number of people who have chosen to sell out their herds this year has to be a concern for every breeder.

I believe feed and hay costs rose significantly due to the drought almost nationwide in 2012. While feed may not have come down in price the hay situation seems to be better this year. Everyone has to look at all costs associated with raising their herd. Where can costs be cut? Many people will plant vegetables to supplement winter feeding. Shopping around for the best price can result in significant savings over a year. Ask other goat farmers in your area what they feed and who they buy from. Ask if you are able to bulk buy for additional savings. Is there a co-op where costs can be shared? Would it be cost effective to have your feed mill mix your own recipe? Vet costs and medicines can be prohibitive. Learn to do as much basic care as you can. Will your vet sell you a dose of high cost medicines instead of a full bottle? Some drugs/medicines are seldom used but kept on hand in case needed. Buy the smallest possible amount as often these will go out of date before use.

At the end of each year, do the math. Everyone needs to know how much their operation costs and if it was profitable or not. Track costs each year and look at percentage increases. If some costs are rising much higher than others, these are the ones to tackle and find a way to decrease. It may be that some parts of your operation are more profitable than others but you need to know exactly where your money is going before you can control costs.

Slow sales are more difficult to target. There is an over population of "myotonic" goats in some areas. Some things that may help would be:

- Advertise anywhere you can, especially where to do so is free. I leave business cards everywhere: restaurants, feed stores, farm stores, work, and pet stores. Always have your business card on you to hand out. Go to local fairs and shows where there will be livestock showing. Even an hour handing out cards to people you will meet can be profitable
- If you need to sell down your herd choose the time when
 most people are in the market to buy—early Spring/
 Summer. Most breeders are trying to sell goats so that they
 can buy goats so it makes sense to advertise early in the
 year.
- Diversify. If you are currently breeding for one main market, consider branching out. Consider the cost of feeding your wether for months hoping to sell him as a pet. Is it more cost effective to take him to market or put him in your freezer?
- Look at the markets for other meat breeds. Many Boer and Kiko farmers are now looking at adding myotonics to their program. Can you break into this market? I have found some of these farmers who originally came to look at bucks have liked the does so much, they come back and purchase. They particularly like breeding age does, which is smart as they can breed to their myotonic buck and get a quick return on their investment. If you do plan to reduce your herd or have does that did not sell this year advertise them in any free meat goats publications, Facebook groups, etc. Advertise the fact that these goats are ready to breed.

I am going to finish by saying everything in this article is my opinion and while I have researched current markets for 2013, I believe that the majority of what I read was other people's opinions.


