WHEN YOUR GOAT IS GIMPY

I know. It's not a very glamorous topic. But your goats' feet are their foundation. If they can't get around with ease, it's hard for them to grow and thrive. Or even be comfortable.

Many, many factors can affect a goat's ability to motor through life. To narrow it down a little, we're just going to focus on their feet. Since footrot is a major scourge we'll give that some serious treatment. Then we'll skim through some of the more common other possibilities for lameness.

Footrot

So there's this bacteria called Fusobacterium necrophorum. Which is too long to say (or type). So we're going to call it Teri. Teri lives naturally in the large intestines of small ruminants. Which means it's in poop. Therefore it's in bedding, barnyards, mud, etc. Teri is everywhere your goats' feet are. It lives best in cool, wet conditions. When it becomes especially concentrated due to good living conditions, it starts to irritate the feet of the goats. This irritation is usually between the toes, where the skin will be inflamed, swollen and damaged - and painful for the goat.

The irritation caused by Teri is called foot scald. Foot scald will usually go away on its own if the goat can be kept in dry conditions for a while. Or it responds readily to treatment with solutions of copper sulfate (Kopertox, for example) or zinc sulfate (Dr. Naylor's Hoof and Heel). There are many of these treatments. Most are labeled for animals other than goats.

Still with me? For foot scald to progress to true footrot, a second bacteria needs to enter the picture. His formal name is Dichelobacter nodosus but we'll call him Dick. Unlike Teri, Dick is not everywhere. He needs to be transported to the scene. Usually on the feet of already infected goats or the bottoms of shoes or the blades of a hoof trimmer previously used on an infected goat. Once he gets to a new host, Dick takes up residence on the foot. He gains entrance via the previously broken -down skin caused by Teri. He can also be aided by bruised feet from hard frozen ground.

Now that Dick has found a home, he begins to rapidly digest the keratinized tissue of the hoof wall. As things progress, the hoof layers separate and a dark, foul-smelling pus is produced. Every step becomes painful for the goat, which will limp or walk on its knees.

So now we have a goat with footrot. But wait - let's back up a little. This could have been prevented if we had kept Dick from entering our property. Remember, he's the bacteria that is not everywhere in the environment. He had to be transferred from an infected goat (or sheep or cow). And Dick can only live in the soil for 10-14 days, depending on moisture and temperature. Here are some ways he could have been kept off our property:

- Carefully inspect the feet of newly purchased goats for signs of infection.
- Quarantine newly purchased goats for at least 14 days before introducing to

the rest of the herd.

- Dip the feet of all newly purchased goats in a footrot-killing solution upon their arrival. Even better, dip several times with a few days between dippings.
- Dip the feet of any goat returning that has been away at fairs, shows or for breeding.
- Protect your footwear when visiting other herds so you don't bring home footrot to your property on your shoes.
 Or disinfect your footwear immediately upon arriving home. The same goes for attending shows and fairs.
- Avoid placing your goats in pens that have possibly contained infected animals in the prior 14 days. Remember – this means sheep and cattle too, not just goats.

Now – back to our goat who's already infected. How do we treat the infection? Here are some steps to take:

- Trim the foot thoroughly, removing all cracked areas and any dead tissue.
- Soak the foot for a few minutes in a container of treatment solution. Again – Dr. Naylor's Hoof and Heel and Kopertox were the only brand names I found in my research. You may need veterinary assistance to find other possibilities.
- Dip all four feet of the infected goat, even if they don't all have signs of footrot.
- Consider systemic treatment of the animal with an antibiotic. I found references to penicillin, streptomycin, tetracycline, erythromycin, florphenicol and oxytetracycline.
- After treatment, turn the goat out into a pen or pasture where no livestock has been for at least 14 days to avoid reinfection.

A few further considerations. It's unlikely only one goat in a herd would develop footrot. Footbaths may have to be used for the entire herd until the owner is confident the disease has been eradicated. I also found several references to vaccines (Footvax, Volar, Fusogard) for footrot which the reader may want to investigate. Although cost was mentioned as a factor in the vaccine use as well as only providing short-term immunity.

Bottom line when it comes to footrot: dealing with it takes up a lot of time and money and causes your animals much discomfort. It makes a lot of sense to take every possible step to keep Dick off your property.

Other Causes of Lameness

We're running out of space. But here's a quick list of other things to consider when a goat comes up lame:

- First, the obvious. Check the leg and foot carefully for wounds and items between the toes.
- Do the goat's hooves need trimmed? It's hard to walk on overgrown skis.
- Laminitis. Also called founder. Usually results from overeating, sudden access to concentrated feeds or high-grain/ low roughage diets. Initially the goat will be running a fever and feet are hot to the touch.
- Epiphysitis. Results from excess dietary calcium (usually from alfalfa hay), excess protein intake or lack of vitamin D (lack of sunshine).
- Caprine arthritis and encephalitis (CAE). This is a viral infection. It comes in two forms. One is neurological (including lameness) and occurs in kids 2-12 months old. The second form occurs in adult goats and is a chronic, progressive arthritis (inflammation of joints), again including lameness.
- Contracted tendons in goat kids. Rarely this may be due to a
 genetic condition. Much more commonly it results from
 uterine crowding and will self-correct. Some breeders believe BoSe will help. If used, be careful not to overdose.
- Joint-ill. A non-specific systemic infection (caused by any of a large variety of bacteria). Usually affects the leg and/or foot joints in very young kids. Treatment is with antibiotics, which may or may not help. Joint-ill can be easily prevented by having goats kid in clean, dry bedding or pasture as well as by dipping navels at birth with an antibiotic solution (usually iodine).

Here's wishing your goats many years of comfortable walking!



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THERE IS DANGER IN THE RAIN

In most parts of the country Mother Nature seems to have lost her mind. Places that are normally damp are wet. Places that have been in drought conditions for years suddenly have enough rain to grow grass and make mud. Nothing is normal. The rain is presenting challenges for goat producers regardless of herd size. Many of these challenges will be things that some goats and their keepers have never faced before. Some of these problems will be a sudden increase in barberpole worm infestation, hoof scald and foot rot.

Infestation of barber pole worms is the most dire of threats for goats across the country. What was once a problem in the Southeast is now problematic in most states due to the ease of travel of goats from one place to another. Simply put, they took their worms with them to new places. In many cases the worms brought along their resistance to commonly used dewormers to their new homes.

To understand the addition of rain to the barberpole eggs now strewn across new pastures, it is helpful to understand simple aspects of the barberpole life cycle. Worm eggs are present in the fecal pellet left on the ground. The addition of moisture not only makes the grass grow but it also helps the eggs hatch. The newly hatched larva climb up the blades of grass and are consumed by the goat as she eats the tender delicious grass. In 18 to 21 days the goat starts to show signs of worm damage caused by the worm consuming blood from the GI tract. Signs can include, rough coat, pale inner eyelids, loss of appetite, scours, rapid weight loss and bottlejaw. Goats need to be watched closely for signs of worm damage about 3 weeks after rainy weather that followed dry conditions.

Animals exhibiting signs must be treated with dewormers right away to stop the damage and save their lives. However, animals that have been treated and do not seem to respond quickly to the treatment need further examination to be sure that the dewormer worked. There is widespread resistance to most common dewormers. Microscopic fecal examination and



compared fecal egg counts before and after treatment will help you identify the deworming product that will work for you and your goats.

Hoof scald is caused by Fusobacterium necrophorum, a bacteria common in the ground. Walking or standing in mud can soften the hoof sufficiently to allow infection between the heels of the hoof. The hoof may be warm to the touch, the lesion between the heels will be quite red and irritated and may have a white film on top of it. It is very painful for the goat and she may walk with a limp or not put the foot down at all. There are many common remedies available to treat hoof scald but management of mud and providing a dry place to walk and stand will help to prevent it.

Hoof scald should not be confused with hoof rot. Hoof rot can be caused by Dichelobacter nodosus, also common in the ground, but while hoof scald may affect a goat or two in your herd, hoof rot is contagious. Hoof rot is a much more serious affliction. The bacteria in hoof rot destroy the tissue between the sole and the wall of the foot and produce lameness, a claylike black exudate and a foul smell. A well-trimmed, dry hoof is less likely to contract hoof rot. Hoof rot is more likely to require antibiotic treatment and affected animals should be kept away from the herd until healed.

The most important aspect to keeping goats healthy is to watch them and know what is normal for each one of them. Most health problems will be seen as subtle changes in a goat's attitude and behavior. If she is not finishing her meal, her ears and tail droop and she is not putting equal weight on all of her feet she may have a problem stemming from the danger in the rain.
