REMINDER: USE OF RFID IMPLANTS AS OFFICIAL ID

This is a reminder to all goat registries that the USDA Animal Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) requirements for using radio frequency identification (RFID) implants, also known as “microchips”, for official identification of goats have recently changed to require the use of implants with the “840” country code. Please make this information available to your members.

In order for a registered goat identified with an implanted RFID to move in interstate commerce without any other form of official identification, the following are required:

1. Implants that are applied to animals **after March 11, 2015** need to start with “840”, the 3 digit country for the United States, rather than the manufacturer code. An updated list of approved 840 implant and official ear tag manufacturers is maintained at :

2. Goats officially identified with implants must be accompanied by a copy of their registration certificate on which the

RFID number is recorded and a reader that can read the implant in the animal.

3. All implants applied **before March 11, 2014** and all ISO compliant implant applied **before March 11, 2015** will be acceptable as official identification for the life of the animal, as long as the requirements in (2) are met.

The preferred site for implants is the base of the ear; however, the tail fold may also be used. Please be sure to notify buyers that the goat has an implant and its location.

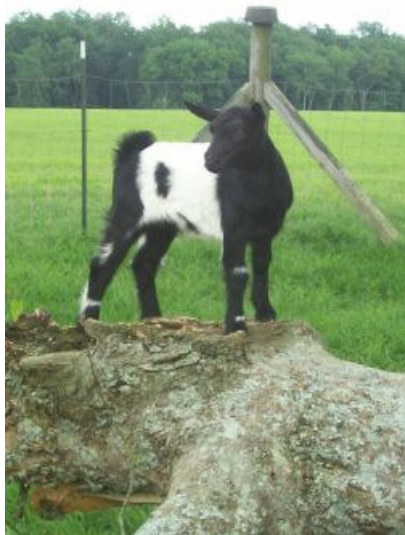

FROM THE FARM...



The first quarter of the year is always a busy time in the MGR office. It is also a very exciting time as many new kids are presented for registration. It is equally impressive that breeders produce such wonderful kids while fighting the snow, ice, and more than a fair share of mud.

The wet conditions and spring weather are the perfect conditions for goats to have issues with coccidiosis, lice, mites and foot problems. Preventive treatment is highly recommended for coccidiosis in kids. Coccidiosis causes poor growth, low weaning weights and can cause death. Lice and mites are common in goats and should be treated in the spring and fall as part of regular health care. Keeping your goats feet trimmed can save a great deal of treating foot issues later on. However, in extremely wet and muddy conditions even the best kept feet can experience problems. Spending a few minutes at feeding time observing your herd will allow you to notice any goats that may be limping.

Early treatment of foot problems tend to require only a few treatments and rarely require the goat to be isolated from the herd.

Many breeders located in Southern states recently received a survey from the University of TN on foot problems in goats. Please take the time to fill out the survey and return it. I am hopeful we will have the best participation of any breed participating in the study.

There has been a greater than normal amount of requests for the registration of bucks without MGR registered parents. I would like to remind everyone if you are purchasing a buck be sure to ask for the registration certificate and a signed transfer at the time of sale. Bucks that do not have both parents registered with MGR are not eligible to be registered.

The 2015 show season is starting to take shape. The Spring Spectacular will be held in Lebanon, TN, at the James E. Ward Agricultural Center on April 10th & 11th. There will be three sanctioned shows offered. This will be the first sanctioned event to offer our new Market Wether program. We will be offering a 50/50 Jackpot for the Market Wether program. The Jackpot will be divided as follows; 50% retained by the show, 30% will be awarded to the Grand Champion & 20% will be awarded to the Reserve Grand Champion. Any money donated to the program will be divided between the Grand Champion & Reserve Grand Champion Market Wether.

The Myotonic Goat Registry will be offering two Judges Training Programs this year, as the registry works towards

the goal of only using MGR Certified Judges at all MGR shows. The first will be on June 18, 2015 in in Tooele, Utah. It will be held in conjunction with the RMFGA Copper Mountain Show. The second will be held in Corydon, IN on September 26, 2015 in conjunction with two MGR Sanctioned Shows and the National Show. Applications are due no later than April 1, 2015 for those attending training in Tooele, UT and applications are due no later than July 24, 2015 for those attending training in Cordon, IN. Space is limited at each Judges Training and applicants are encouraged to apply early.

The MGR National Show will be held in Cordon, IN on Saturday, September 26, 2015. This will be in conjunction with the Judges Training and two sanctioned shows. Exhibitors looking to earn those last points to qualify for Nationals will have the opportunity to do so at the Friday Sanctioned Show & the Saturday morning Sanctioned Show. This will be the first National Show to offer a National title for a Market Wether.

THE GOURMET GOAT: GOATS, OATS & HONEY PARFAIT



Ingredients*

2 cups vanilla flavored goat yogurt
 1 1/2 cups Oats & Honey with Raisins & Almonds cereal
 1-2 cups fresh blueberries, strawberries or raspberries or a mixture of all three

*Amounts may need to be adjusted depending on the size of the parfait glasses used.

Instructions:

Start with a layer of fruit in the bottom of two parfait glasses. Then put a layer of the yogurt in each glass. Top with layer of cereal and then another layer of fruit. Repeat layers with remaining ingredients, ending with a layer of fruit. Serve immediately. Makes two servings.

INTRODUCING THE NEW MGR MARKET WETHER PROGRAM

This will be a new program that will make its debut at the Spring Spectacular Show held in Lebanon, TN, at the James E. Ward Agricultural Center on April 10th & 11th.

This program will not replace the Platinum Wether Program. I hope the new program will help educate our breeders about the Wether Market as well as generate more interest in the MGR Wether.

PROGRAM RULES

- 1) Wethers must show no evidence of permanent teeth.
- 2) Wethers may be shown in bands until 3 months of age.
- 3) No percentage Wethers shall be shown and all Wethers must be registered with the Myotonic Goat Registry.
- 4) Polled, disbudded or horned Wethers may be shown.
- 5) Wethers may be shown in natural coat but must be clean & hair must be no longer than ½ inch.
- 6) Wethers must be shown by date of birth. The divisions shall be light-weight and heavy-weight. The divisions shall be defined as:
 - Light-weight Wether under six months of age.
 - Heavy-weight Wether six months and older without evidence of permanent teeth.
- 7) The light-weight division shall be judged as 0-3 months & 3-6 months old. The heavy-weight division shall be judged as 6-9 months & 9 months & older.
 - A light-weight Wether champion & reserve champion shall be chosen from the 1st & 2nd place class winners in the light-weight division.
 - A heavy-weight Wether champion & reserve champion shall be chosen from the 1st & 2nd place class winners in the heavy-weight division.
 - The champion and reserve champion from the light-weight & heavy-weight divisions will return to the ring and be judged for overall Market Champion & Reserve Market Champion.
- 8) In order to record a point in the Market Wether program there must be at least 3 Wethers regardless of division.
 - There must be at least three owners (which will be counted by MGR Breeder numbers) on record to sanction.
- 9) Any Wether earning one point as a Champion Market Wether will be eligible to compete in the Market National Class.
 - Market Wethers may only show in one Wether division at the National Show.
 - Market Wether points will not count towards the Platinum Wether Program.
- 10) The sanction fee for the Market Wether Program shall be \$20.00.

BREEDER STACI ROGERS—MOENNING HILL FARM

Growing up on a dairy farm with two older brothers, I was always assigned livestock duty while they were at work in the field with my dad. It was fine with me, as I had a natural gift for working with animals. So years after marriage and having a child of my own, I found myself wanting to get back into livestock, but on a much "smaller" scale.

I always wanted a couple of goats, so after visiting a goat farm one year while on vacation, we arrived back home and I told my husband I wanted goats for my birthday, which was a couple of weeks later. We happened across an ad for fainting goats in a farm publication and decided to do some research. What we learned had us very excited at the prospect of owning this magnificent breed. We visited the farm and traveled home with four goats in tow; a buck, two does and a four month old doeling. It did not take us long to fall head over heels (no pun intended) in love with our goats. And then the addiction began...

Within that first year, we added another buck and several more does. Babies started arriving the following spring. We added a few more, sold some, had more babies and suddenly six years later in 2014, the arrival of 38 babies born that spring put our "smaller" scale operation up over 100 goats. In the early years I started out with an all black and white herd, as it was reminiscent of the Holstein cattle my family raised for over 30 years. Eventually I added some color to the herd and have quite a variety now.

Now in our seventh year, we've learned a lot, but still have so much more to learn. I've earned a veterinary assistant degree and the Langston University Meat Goat Producer Certification, both to help me gain knowledge to better manage the health of my herd. I've learned a ton of

knowledge from all of you, my fellow MGR breeders. I've taken that knowledge and made some tough decisions with my herd, cutting out some of my favorites to keep only the best stock. I also learned that raising 100 goats was not a good fit for our life.

I manage two banking centers in two different counties and my husband also works full-time. I am on three different non-profit boards. My daughter Whitney, a sophomore, plays varsity basketball and volleyball for her school, and plays club ball in both sports year round. As you can imagine, time at home is rare, thus I made the difficult decision last fall to begin reducing my herd. It hasn't been easy and there were lots of tears as the buyers left the farm with my goats in tow. They've gone to great homes and I have reduced my herd to a more manageable number. How many? I'm not sure any of us MGR breeders could successfully answer that question, especially when I have several pregnant does in the barn, ready to kid any day now. Let's just say I am somewhere around fifty. Give or take fifteen goats. Maybe twenty.

Whitney's weekend tourneys have not allowed us to show in any MGR shows yet, however that is a

goal of mine someday. Along with my brother's family, we petitioned our local fair to have Myotonic goats added a few years ago and I have also helped several other counties get a Myotonic show at their fairs. Our fair is now in the third year, and rumor has it that we've had so much success setting up shows at local fairs, that they will have their own show this year at the state fair. We sell a lot of our goats to local 4H members, and I love hearing back from them on their success in the show arena.

Whitney is a youth breeder for the MGR and has had a lot of success at our fair with the goats she's bred and raised own her own. Her 5 month old junior doe that she herself selected the breeding for, won grand champion Myotonic doe last year. It makes me proud to see her following in my footsteps and working to improve her herd.

HOOF TRIMMING GUIDE

Hoof trimming should be done regularly since problems with hooves are usually due to their improper or infrequent care. Hoof problems can affect the overall health of the animal, so timely care is important.

You will need a hoof pick to remove as much debris as possible. To do the actual trimming, a rose pruner (small, Teflon-coated blades) is easy to use if you have small hands. If the animal is very large and the hooves are hard, you may need to use hoof rot shears. Also, it is recommended that you wear gloves; it is easy to accidentally cut yourself with these sharp instruments.

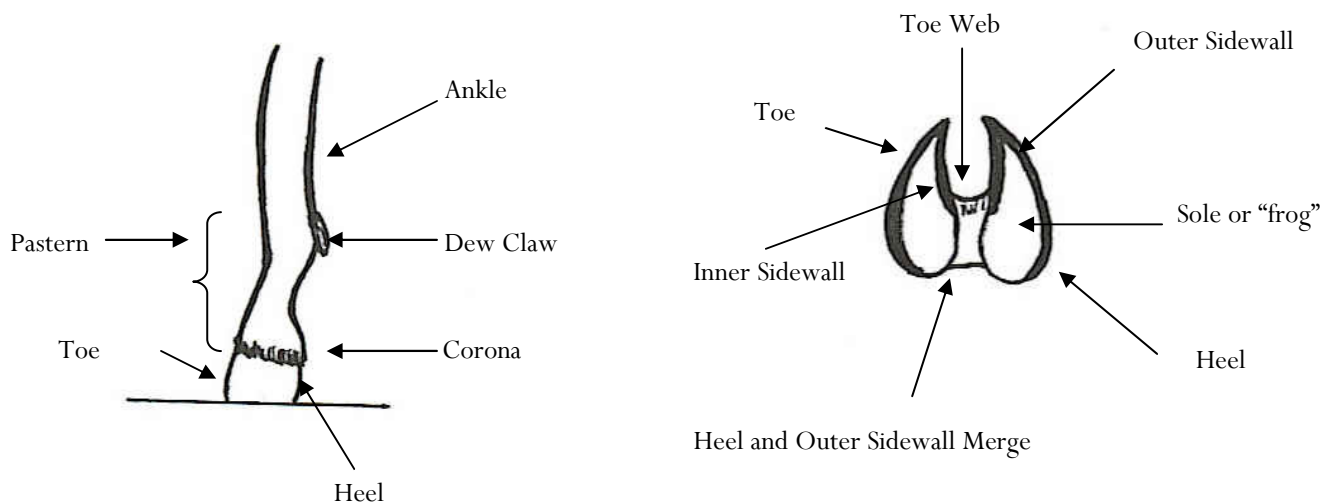

The animal needs to be restrained. We place the goat on a milking stand which allows us to restrain the animal's head. We place a bowl of food near their face so they can eat and this distracts them from trying to escape. You can also tie the animal to a fence post with a short rope. With your body, force the goat to stand with its side against the fence while you trim the hooves. Trim front and back hooves on one side, then turn the goat the opposite way to complete the trim on the other side.

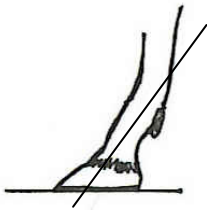
To trim front hooves, lift the hoof and bend the knee while positioning the hoof just below the animal's elbow. Remove debris with hoof pick. Cut away sidewall overgrowth. Trim the outer sidewall down as far as the point where the heel and outer sidewall merge. Trim heel, keeping the surface flat from side to side. Trim the outer sidewall working toward the front.

HOOF TRIMMING GUIDE CONTINUED

From the corona to the sole, the depth of the hoof should be only slightly deeper at the tip than at the heel in order to create pastern angles that are nearly straight up and down.

Correct Angle

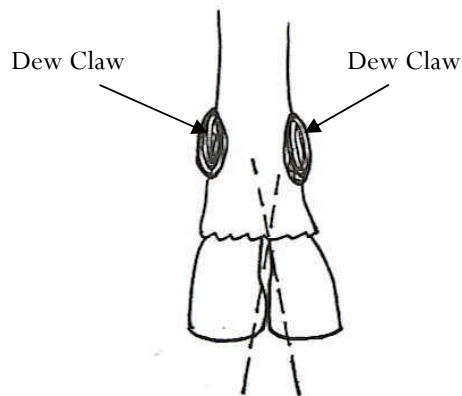

Trim inner sidewall from the tip of the toe backward to the heel and absolutely level with the outer sidewall. Where the inner sidewall ends, there is a portion not attached to the side of the toe. Trim this close so it doesn't collect debris or get torn. Once the sidewalls are trimmed, portions of the heel and sole are trimmed to be level with the sidewalls so the bottom of the toe is flat.

Sometimes the heel grows in the space between the toes and this should be trimmed; otherwise, the toes will point outward.

Dew claws may need to be trimmed also. Just trim enough to get rid of ragged edges.

If you slip and cut too deep, spray with iodine solution and use blood-stopper powder as needed. If the cut is deep, you may need to pack the wound and bandage tightly to allow the blood to clot.

Regular and timely hoof care is important to the goat's overall health. It is much easier to trim hooves more frequently rather than waiting for them to become seriously overgrown.
