BASIC STRUCTURE 1. Head & Expression	20/20	<p>Head: Medium length, broad muzzle, strong broad jaw, straight to slightly concave face.</p> <p>Ears: To be of medium length, near horizontal, forward facing in a non alerted state. The middle portion of the ear should be somewhat cylindrical. Ears should not extend past the corner of the lip when flattened against the face. Ears should not break over or droop. A half inch ripple effect is permissible in the center of the top side of the ear. When viewing the profile, the ears should be set slightly behind and level (or slightly higher) with the eye.</p> <p>Eyes: Alert, Bold, wide set, prominent, should bulge slightly. Any color.</p> <p>Bite: Incisors meet dental pad evenly.</p> <p>Horns: Shall have a minimum of 1.5" between the bases. They should protrude upward and then turn backward and then turn outward. Polled or disbudded are correct.</p>	<p>Head: Roman nose or deeply concave face- Very Serious</p> <p>Ears: Erect, broken over, too long or too short, deeply waved- Very Serious</p> <p>Eyes: Sunken, very small- Serious</p> <p>Bite: Under bite or Over bite- Serious</p> <p>Missing or having extra teeth- Moderate</p> <p>Horns: Pointed forward- Very Serious</p> <p>Too close together or laying too flat against the neck- Moderate</p>	Total blindness, crooked face, disfiguring Malocclusion, pendulous, elf, twisted or folded
2. Neck, Chest & Shoulders	10/10	<p>Neck: Muscular, blending smoothly into chest and withers.</p> <p>Chest: Wide chest floor, prominent brisket.</p> <p>Shoulder: Firmly attached shoulder blades, full at point of elbow.</p>	<p>Neck: Thin, ewe neck- Very Serious</p> <p>Chest: Narrow- Moderate</p> <p>Shoulder: Poor attachment or loose elbows- Moderate to Very Serious depending on severity</p>	Neck drawn to one side

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3. Legs, Pasterns & Feet	10/10	<p>Fore legs: Muscular, straight front & side, strong, clean, smooth knees.</p> <p>Rear legs: Muscular, good angulation, perpendicular line from pin bones through rear of hocks & pasterns, straight from rear, strong bone.</p> <p>Front and Rear Legs set squarely under each corner of the body. Rear feet should track straight behind the front feet. Pasterns should be strong, flexible, short to medium length. Feet should be short, tight toes, pointed forward, set at a 50-60 degree angle.</p>	<p>Knock Kneed, Bow-Legged, Cow Hocked, Post-Legged, Lack of Muscle Definition- Moderate to Very Serious depending on severity.</p> <p>Poor Tracking- Serious</p> <p>Feet turned in or out- Moderate to Serious depending on severity.</p>	<p>Enlarged Knees, Hocks or Ankles</p>
4. Barrel, Back, Loin, Rump	10/10	<p>Barrel: Ribs long, well sprung, deep, blending smoothly into a strong flank.</p> <p>Back: Strong, level, thick, wide, muscular.</p> <p>Loin: Long and wide but proportionate, well muscled and thick.</p> <p>Rump: Strong, wide, slightly angled from hips to pins. Reproductive Organs		Evidence the wethering process was not commenced in the days leading up to the show, as described below:		No evidence of the wethering process. Scrotum is still present, not swollen or shrunken, not fully healed, has open tissue. Elastrator Band still present on Wethers over 3 months of age.

- a. **Elastrator (Banding) Method-** Wethers 0-3 months of age may be shown with a band as long as there is evidence the band was not placed in the days leading up to a show. Swelling of the scrotum would indicate the blood flow to the scrotum had been stopped and would indicate the band was not freshly applied. Wethers over 3 months of age may not be shown with a band. The scrotum should be completely gone and fully healed with no open tissue.
- b. **Burdizzo (Clamping) Method-** Wethers of any age may be shown as long as visual observation indicates this process did not take place in the days leading up to a show. Swelling and shrinkage of the scrotum would indicate the blood flow to the scrotum had been stopped. Visual observation will also show the crush sites where the Burdizzo instrument was applied and the spermatic cords and associated blood vessels were crushed. The scrotum will shrivel and shrink, and the testies will become hard knots and dry up within 2 weeks from application. A small sac will remain after this process is fully complete.
- c. **Knife (Cutting) Method-** Wethers of any age must be fully healed with no open tissue from this process.

Attention Judges: Please examine each wether (with hands) to verify that there are no testes apparent in their scrotal area, stomach or groin. If such tissue is discovered, that goat will be disqualified. See descriptions above on the wethering methods. Do not inspect teats on wethers because goats do not reproduce.

Any Platinum Wether competing in MGR Sanctioned Shows must be wethered and evidence of the wethering process as described below must be obvious from visual observation by the judge. Wethers with open tissue who are not fully healed may not be shown. All Platinum Wethers must be registered as a wether. Wethers being shown whose MGR registration certificate still has them registered as a buck are not allowed to be shown until a Registration Correction has been completed.

Effective 1/1/2023; pinch/prong/spike collars are not allowed while exhibiting Platinum Wethers. Please make sure exhibitors are not using these collars.
